Early Years Foundation Stage (Reception)	<p>Using the topic of Houses & Homes Reception children will experience the following 7 areas of learning:</p> <p>Communication and language give children opportunities to experience a rich language environment; to develop their confidence and skills in expressing themselves; and to speak and listen in a range of situations.</p> <p>Physical development provide opportunities to be active and interactive; and to develop their co-ordination, control, and movement. Children will also be helped to understand the importance of physical activity, and to make healthy choices in relation to food.</p> <p>Personal, social and emotional development help children to develop a positive sense of themselves, and others; to form positive relationships and develop respect for others; to develop social skills and learn how to manage their feelings; to understand appropriate behaviour in groups; and to have confidence in their own abilities.</p> <p>Literacy encourage children to link sounds and letters and to begin to read and write. Children will be given access to a wide range of reading materials to ignite their interest.</p> <p>Mathematics provide children with opportunities to develop and improve their skills in counting, understanding and using numbers, calculating simple addition and subtraction problems; and to describe shapes, spaces, and measure.</p> <p>Understanding the world guide children to make sense of their physical world and their community through opportunities to explore, observe and find out about people, places, technology and the environment.</p> <p>Expressive arts and design enable children to explore and play with a wide range of media and materials, as well as providing opportunities and encouragement for sharing their thoughts, ideas and feelings.</p>
